The View from the Director's Chair By Cletus Poser, FMBL Director

It has been 9.5 years since the installation of the metal roof on the addition was finished. Expected lifespans, when located on the beach, has ranged between 10-50 years when salt and rust have been removed and repaired. The first picture shows the before and after of the mold buildup on the gutters in front of the building. There

were many more. The original roof installers gave an estimate for pressure washing but another company had a better bid and also painted the benches and yellow caution poles seen in the next two photos.

In the process of having different companies look at the roof and do the pressure washing, two holes, several rusting metal pieces and gutter drainage problems leading to rust were discovered with the help of drones. That project is waiting for completion of bids by two companies that have already looked at the roof.

The garage metal lattice openings allow the breeze to flow through and the rain has blown in as well, rusting the metal sills. One option is to seal and paint but the company that originally installed them no longer deals with metals and will be proposing an aluminum alternative, which will eliminate the need to keep repainting the rust stains on that wall.

Art on Display: Top 100 Paintings by Berry van Boekel

Come meet Berry van Boekel and enjoy his Top 100 paintings from 2021. The Top 100 began as a hobby for Berry during his teen years in the Netherlands as a way to pay tribute to his musical heroes. The first Top 100 collection debuted in 1991 and has continued annually.






The 2021 exhibition consists of painted double portraits featuring a juxtaposition of the recorder and the one recorded and are accompanied by audio field recordings compiled by Berry so bring your smartphone and ear buds to listen to the music. Light refreshments will be served at the reception, July 29th.







For those of us who love travel and adventure, these past few years probably kept us closer to home. But as many parts of the world began lifting restrictions and travel became a bit more accessible and a little less daunting, I found that "someplace" for me was the capital of the Czech Republic, Prague.



The city of Prague is an architectural jewel. Our first day was spent in the area known as Old Town. This was the site of a major crossroad on the 12th century trade route and the focal point of the city's early development. The influence of various cultures and styles are evident in the mix of Romanesque, Baroque and Gothic architecture. One of the highlights of the afternoon was witnessing the 15th century Astronomical Clock come alive on the hour with what is called the "Walk of the Apostles". This clock was first installed in 1410 and is now the oldest in operation in the world. It not only tells the time and date but shows astronomical and zodiacal information but also provides some theater for viewers as the statues become animated.

Strolling over the famous Charles Bridge is a lovely way to view Prague Castle. The castle is the residence of the Czech president and was the seat of bohemian kings and Holy Roman emperors of old. The bridge is a medieval stone arch bridge that crosses the Vltava River. Started in 1357 under the auspices of King Charles IV and finished in the early 15th century, the bridge is decorated by 30 statues most in the baroque style. The bridge is also a great place to find artists and craftsmen displaying locally crafted items.

The only privately owned section of Prague Castle is owned by the Lobkowicz family. This palace museum is filled with Medieval and Renaissance works of art and hand-annotated manuscripts by Haydn, Mozart and Beethoven. After enjoying a wonderful lunch in





one of the private dining rooms, we were treated to a classical music concert in the elegant concert hall. Our afternoon was filled with exquisite art, delicious food and beautiful music!

On our last day in the Czech capital, we decided to enjoy a ride

through the scenic countryside to the town of Kutna Hora. At one time, this area was the site of a prosperous silver mine and was considered a cultural rival to Prague. One of the most interesting spots in Kutna Hora is The Church of All Saints. Within this Roman Catholic chapel is a most unusual site. On the lower level there is a small chapel called the Sedlec Ossuary



that is adorned with over 40,000 human skeletons. Beginning in 1278, the graveyard surrounding the church became very popular for burials when "Holy Soil" from Jerusalem was spread on the grounds.



In the 15th century, many of the remains were relocated to the lower level of the church to make room for the town's expansion. In 1870 the bones were excavated and organized into religious displays. This was intended to remind us that the chapel has always been and remains today to be a respectful place of worship despite its rather unusual contents. No photography is allowed in the holy space. The chapel is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and one of the most visited sites


in the Bohemian region. Another stop that afternoon was St. Barbara Cathedral which is dedicated to the patron saint of miners. It is considered one of Central Europe's most impressive Gothic structures.



We ended our adventure in Prague with a tour of the city at night. Starting with a trip to Zizkov TV tower, the highest building in the city, we enjoyed spectacular views of this gorgeous city. Prague Castle and Charles Bridge at night were even more impressive. Our last stop for the evening was at the

Strahov Monastery where we enjoyed a local beer as

well as stunning vistas from its grounds overlooking Prague!



My adventures this year did not end with my trip to Prague, but the medieval brilliance of the city made Prague a true treasure!



Real Florida Reader Program



Through a partnership among the Florida Department of State's Division of Library and Information Services, you can check out a Real Florida Reader pass from the Fort Myers Beach Library for free admission to one of more than 170 participating state parks as long as you have a FMB Library card.

You can use your FMB Library card to check out a day pass, which provides free admission to state parks for up to 8 people in a vehicle. Parks excluded: Ellie Schiller Homosassa Springs Wildlife State Park, Skyway Fishing Pier State Park and Weeki Wachee Springs State Park. The promotion will run through September 12.


